As to your German candidate farm-manager's system of religion - lutheran: well, it might be better and would certainly be more promising if he were known to be a practical Catholic; but if he give evidence of honesty and the fear of God and thrift as best he can - with experience bhind him, I would be /////r inclined to him rather than to a fresh graduate from most/ of our universities who have had little or no practical farm experien.

After all the lutherans, as a rule, know more of Christianity than most any of the other non-catholic Christian denominations. The whole trouble with honest protestants — and thank God there a lot of such — is that thy simply do not know the real relationship between their own denomination and the Mother-church. Otherwise equal, I would take a conscientious lutheran ten times in preference to just a nominal Catholic. I know from childhood how to appreciate German lutherans. If the change of clamate benot too radical and this man's wife and daughter can aide, etc, I would be inclined in his favor.

In the mean time, however, let us pray for divine grudance - especially turning to St. Josep and the Poor Souls. How about inviting the latter to - especially our own relatives amongst them - to take an interest with us and become missionaries with a promise to enroll them, e.g., for a certain % of the proffits. That I always call a double charity; to our neighbor, viz, to our fellow members of the militent Church, the missionaries and their work and then to the Church-suffering, the poor, holy souls.

No. I can not say that I am exactly from St. Paul, Minn; though many a pleasant day I spent in that thrifty city - with relatives and friends and in the Seminary, as guest.

Coming two years in June, on my way to Seattle, I visited an old friend of mine Mike Costello who had been moldest brother's bare-foot-boy friend on our farms sixty-five years before and about forty miles down the River on the Wisconsin side. Later, when I was about 17, I did a term in the Stillwater Penetentiary (less thantwo months), and I found Mike there ahead of me and we became bed-fellows - he a boiler-maker and his partner just "a roustabout". Some years after that the one became a lieutenant in the Saint Paul police-department; the other a poor Capuchin and a priest. Mike was in his 80s and wasalmost hlind when we went to see hm on said trip - seemingly rejuvanited at our visit. My Dear Friend Joseph: God bless you and yours, especially Mrs; ofcourse. Just a short word Tonight to tell you a little about Rev. Father Guardian's transition, as we all hopeto his better place in God's providence beyond the grave. First, however, I want to thank you for your kind favor of last week, duly received and noted as requested, which I forgot to acknowledge over the phone the night-before-last.

About a year ago Father Guardian - Mtthias - took a very threatening turn and for several months, till early March, was not really able to come down to the refectory or to choir-services. During that period he was able to sleep very little and that only in the chair. However, it would seem he'd been reading the lifeof one of our great modern missionaries, the late most Rev. Bishop Hartman of India, and made a noveina to his honor and in petition that he do something for him, to be able at least to fulfil the principal duties of his office. Athe the end of the novena, thanks be to God and the great missionary, Father Guardian came to Choir and refectory and also to recreation up to the very last. Even Sunday night, just a few hours befor his final sleep, he seemed even more than usually entertaining; so that one would almost think he would'nt mind conversing all niggt. He was always a great reader and though apparently cared little about showing his ability, the advantage of his reading and study was often manifest.

What was better, he was a man of lively faith with an unusually wide experience and with trials and hardships from early childhood that were hardly ever wanting to tame and to mellow and soften his naturally firey nature.

Peerhaps the bitterest disapoint of his whole life was that regarding his, from-early-childhood vocation to be a priest in the Capuchin-Franciscan Order; - a disapointment which having been suffered in resignation, was lifted in God's own merciful way and time; - surely an example in confirmation of St. Paul's ""For those who love God, all things turn for the best." He had become cigar-maker in early boyhood to help raise the big family,of which he was the eldest; and then a gardner and musician, etc. etc; when he learned to his great joy and hope, afteras was generally thought to be too late to study for the holy Priesthood, that in America there was still a possibility of becoming a priest and at that, a Capuchin Franciscan. His smoldering hopes at once revived and as soon as possible he came to America.

He had never an incling of the knocks and dispointments still between him and the realization of his goal. Neverthe less, as his calmness of countenance attested while he waited for the undertaker, in exactly the position he had taken for his last long seep — with his left foot on the stool, his hand under his head inclined to the same side and his rosary over his sholder. The Father who was to have the last holy Mass that morning tiptoed in and out, to see the special intention, never dreaming but that Father Guardian was just supplying, as usual, something of the sleep so much of which he was wont to miss during the nights.

Surely his desire to "die in the harness",/as he had so often expressed it -- and even about forty hours before, after his solmn Mass in the morning and sermon at Brlther Cook's final profession,-- was happily realized. Thanks be to the merciful God. How wonerful in His all ways!

His long experience as superior and the difficulties metwith during his whole life, by the grace of God, had fitted him to be a really ideal Father Guardian. Much as I was with him - and I assisted him at his first and second holy Masses - I never but once saw him as really "next to upset"; and that was in connection with something that fell to my duty to execute. I was indignant myself at the very appearance of the situation, as I realized at once that it must appear to him. I surely sympathized with him as I saw him just ready to call me down and as I felt he would be fully justified if appearance had not deceived him. Less than ten words fully satisfied his demand without my even hanging up a long-distance call. The first chance he had afterward, he expressed regret at his manifestation of his weakness. May his dear soul rest with the saints!

I was talking with Joe. this Horning and he told me you were not very well and that you are inclined to worry, etc. Ofcourse that is a weakness of which very few of Adam's children are entirely free. Indeed it is something we all have to be on our guard against as a most insidious enemy to our peace of soul. Afterall, if we look back as many decads as possible and recollect, we will be easily convinced that our biggest worries have always been about womething that never happened; eg, twenty years ago on your way to "Good Saint Ann in Qubeck". ... 0! Instead of worrying about anything - past or threatening to come les us foster confidence in God by thanking Him ahead of time. No creatur, when there is question of generosity, can ever get within a weakest shadow of anythin like even dreaming to beat the Lord in generosity or anything else. But God loves to load confidently loving souls with supernatural, divine generosity.

As for what they call an anatomical operation after death; it seems to me, such a thing should be the very last thing in the world to worry about. On the contrary, while in the vast majority of such cases there is very little operating done, the idea is possibly to help some similar case or cases still suffering or to suffer in future. For my part I shall consider it as doing an actof charity after my death if they can use my old bones for fertilizing. ... As for worrying because about past stupidities and sins: It just seems to me that we ought to be so occupied in gratefully thanking God for having rescued us from Hell and from the jaws of our unruly passions that we should find no time to worry about anything - save possibly, that about making so little progress toward progress in the way of perfection, etc.....

In regard to those thoughtless associates who refer to the "age of miracles" as past; I would say simply that to doubt the truth of miracles in any age of history or seriously to question their existance, would be nothing less than just to fall in line with the ideals of the unbelieving world - deaf, dumb and spiritually blind, - whose WANT of principle is atheism the climax of insanity and whose prince and inspiration is Lucifer himself the king of all (dam) fools.

I have two holy Masses this morning - 9 and 12 - and therefore, I can not think of going into details as I would like to do; but just to encourage you to persevere in patience and resignation to God's holy will, I am going to give you a few lines from a letter received last March, which I happened to pick up and reread just before opening yours of the-day-before yesterday. It comes from a nurse-friend in the State Hospital, Cleveland, Ohio.

Here follows some of the letter:

My dear Mr. Bracken:

God bless you and yours. I hope the outlook for you son is brightening since you wrote me last week. At all events, I hope we can help him. In fact, I think I ought to say, "Thanks be to God, I am confident that we can help him." This especially, if you and Mrs. Bracken and your friends who are interested, will do your parteach in his way. First, I want to tell you that I had an experience of skin-trouble similar to that of which you write your son is having and can sympathize with him even according to the little stanza:

"The mourners tear hath furrowed kindly faces,
And left the light of love abiding there,
Sweet sympathy and tender deeds are traces
Of pain and sorrow soothed in silent prayer."

You tell me that Mrs. Bracken is not Catholic. I hope she as well as yourself - both of you - are earnest about saving your own souls. However, I am convinced more and more every day that such afflictions - in fact, that the trials and crosses of life in general - are sent us or at least permitted, primarily to wake us up and make us do better; in other words, "to switch us into line" in right thinking, and bring to our minds something of the shortness of things earthly - joys and pleasures as well as sorrows and disappointments, etc., and thus incline us to appreciate Eternity and the Eternal. Hence the old saying: "Whom the Lord loveth, He chastiseth."

Now, what can we each of us do to help to induce the Good God to lift this cross from the boy? If you send me his name, I shall inscribe him in our missionary work whereby he will have the benefits of prayers and holy Masses continually and, in a way may become - indirectly a foreigh missionary. The following might be a practical example with just a few details. It happened a few years ago when on a certain morning there was quite a crown waiting here in the Monastery office, and old-looking couple slowly rose from their seats and approaching the desk, asked in German, if they could speak to me personally. As we started into another room, I smelled a cancer, though I was not certain what it was till the old lady told me that her husband had cancer and could not work any more. She was the spokesman, and made no secret of it whatever. After a little I asked if they went to the holy Scraments regularly. "My husband is not a Catholic," she answered. "Then, Mr. N.," I said, "You do something in your own honest way to please the God God." "What could I do to please Him? I was raised a Lutheran but for twenty years I have practiced no religion." "It's a poor way to be, man;" I answered, "and especially if you take it as I define Religion. THE SCIENCE OF OUR RELATIONSHIP WITH GOD AND OUR NEIGHBOR - I might say -OF OUR DEPENDENCE ON GOD AND OUR NEIGHBOR. To practice no religion is making a secondary matter of the primary purpose of our creation as rational beings, viz., TO KNOW GOD; that we may love Him and serve Him and be happy with Him. Now I'll tell you what you can do to please God. Just start and be earnest about saving your soul." "After all" I added, if you are a Lutheran, you believe in Jesus Christ. I believe in Him as a Catholic; so we are both Christians, and one way or other we must be brothers.

This last especially seemed to please him and he answered, decidedly brightening up; "Yes, yes, that is right."

I would have taken the man to be eighty; whereas he was only forty -nine. But from the constant pain and stench of his malady he could neither eat nor sleep and it seemed to me he was wishing that he were already in the grave. Honestly, he did not look as though he would live another week and I feared he might go off in despair. To inspire him with as much hope as I could I proposed to him about as follows:

"Now, Mr. N. . . . I am going to tell you something else that you can do to please God. I am inscriping your name now in our missionary work, the Seraphic Mass Association, for prayers and holy Masses always being offered for the members. You, on your part could promise the Good God in your own honest way, that if it helps, you will be earnest in finding out for yourself the difference, rather the relationship - between your denomination and the "Mother Church," which latter is, of course, none other than the Catholic." Without the least hesitation he answered at once; "Ich tu es." (I'll do it.") Then, seeing his readiness and his growing interest, I added: "And, I can assure you beforehand that inasmuch as you are earnest and honest in this matter - and prayerful at the same time -- in just so much will it become as clear to you as twice two are four, that you have your Christianity not directly from Jesus. but directly and historically you have it (inasmuch as it is Christianity) as said before, from the "Mother Church" - call yourself what you may.

Like a drowning man who grasped my hand when only a youth, so now this poor patient seemed to hang on every word of hope. "Historisch" he repeated, "Historically? That is true! I'll do it."
. . . . Next morning, about two hours earlier than the day before, he walked in seemingly quite a different person. There was color in his face and a smile on his countenance. He was twenty years younger looking as he walked over to the desk without stop or hesitation to greet me; "Guter Morgan" - (Good Morning.) "I came to see if I could start taking instructions today.

The above is a single case from many similar - I think I'd be safe to say one out of thousands. I very seldom go into such details and while I've tried to encourage quite a few cancer patients by telling them about this one, I have never written about it before. I hope it may not be a bore to anyone. On the contrary; may it be an inspiration and an example for many, not only for cases of eczema and cancer, but for whatever trouble may be met with. Our sad weakness today is our lack of faith and consequently, want of confidence in God.

In case you be in Detroit, or if, without too much inconvenience, the boy might be able to call down at the Monastery, I would be pleased to meet you. Hoping that by this time he is feeling improved and again wishing you and yours God's New Year's Blessing, I beg to remain,

At the same time, however, and the more I think it over, I would be wanting in appreciation of the confidence you manifest in writing me such a letter if, even while condoling with you, I failed, to at least intimate a gentle congratulation. This of course, not on the death of such an ideal wife and mother as was your Kathleen but on your fortune - perhaps wholly unmerrited on your part - of having for years had such a model of Christian perfection to live with and to drinkin for so long the spiritual influences necessarily radiating from the outstanding virtues manifest in the very-day life of any such a Christian. No wonder that you now lament feeling "bankrupt without her".

Your bereavement; yes; inasmuch as viewed through the melancholy lenses of worldly wisdom, so sadly inclined to exclude faith in God and consequently confidence in a favorable hereafter, would be an irreparable loss and misfortune. But O! what a contrast in the light of Christian faith that illuminates the soul of the really practical believer!. They (the prisoners) had been saying the holy rosary and having Benediction every day and Pontifical Mass every Sunday that they might be rescued without anything too drastic. Most of the prisoners were so starved that they could hardly walk. About 20 actually died of malnutrition starved....

His in-laws phoned from St. Rose Parish Detroit and we enrolled him...To their astonishment he went back to work without any operation. After two weeks work, the doctors induced him to go finish up on the X.R. Same T.R .--Same T. Ryan got a relapse and died. I have known of several such cases.

Be grateful to God, therefore, and attribute miracles to whom they due. I hope Drs. find further surgery uncalled for. There is a similar case related in the "life" of our stigmatic -P. Pio. A certain poor, good woman was quite hopeless with cancer. She and her Husband went to Paadre Pio and she was cured. Afterwards (I presume) without consulting Padre Pio and she got sick again and P. Pio said he could, he could do nothing.....

The following is a faithful transcription of a printed description and recipe for Baked Beans written by the Servant of God, Father Solanus Casey O.F.M.Cap.

(Father Solanus supplied not only the recipe for Baked Beans printed in the Eucharistic Mission Band Cook Book, but he also wrote a introduction and described his own experience, found on page 60 - EMB Cook Book, published in 1945.)

BAKED BEANS

Like potatoes, beans may be served in almost innumerable ways with good advantage at once to the cook and the guest. From the following actual experience of the writer may be culled a practical recipe for preparing and serving -- Real Boston Baked Beans.

A certain monastery in charge of a struggling parish, wishing in a way to forestall the financial drain often consequent on Thanksgiving Dinners, proclaimed to friends near and far the staging of a real Boston Baked Beans Dinner. This was to be just a week ahead of the great turkey Thursday.

The Inspector himself was given the privilege of superintending the beans, supposed to be at once the staple feature of the repast and the highlight of the meal.

Priding himself more or less on the distinction, his first step was to get in touch with and have an understanding with the amiable Brother Cook (Wendlin) at the Monastery. They decided to put the beans to soak the Sunday night instead of Tuesday before the dinner. In that way they figured on about a good half-hour in a hot oven for the dinner Thursday evening.

They boiled them according to the recipe below and had them in the best condition Monday evening. When others sampled them the next morning they seemed even further improved. "Unsurpassable," was the word. Three days to wait for their grand display seemed long, but we were content - confident that the delay would not lessen their value and appreciation.

But our pride, however legitimate it may have been, was to get a really practical jolt. Thursday morning finally came and was ideal - could hardly be more promising for a successful affair that night. So wishing to further cooperate with Brother Cook, the inspector made his way to the monastery kitchen. Brother, too was in best of smiles as they met at the kitchen door. But:

"Oh, Brother Cook," exclaimed the inspector, on seeing the previously baked beans, fifty gallons strong, leisurely sitting on the heated back of the stove where they had been since Monday. "That is a bad place for those beans. They should have been in a cool place for keeping." He sampled them. "Sour!" he exclaimed. "Sour!" sighed the brother, as he tasted them himself. They gazed vacantly at each other for a moment. They both felt stupidly guilty. They both thought of the same baseball phrase, "---three men on bases, - Casey struck out!"

Their guardian angels must have smiled, for each blamed himself rather than the other. "Wait." exclaimed one of them with a gleam of hope, "Saleratus sweetens sour milk, if not too far gone. Let us try it on the beans." They boiled a sample quantity adding a pinch of saleratus (simple baking powder). The unintended experiment, with the magic powder coming to the rescue, had made the beans a credit for a king's banquet. Such at least was the general verdict that night.

"THE INSPECTOR HIMSELF"

THE RECIPE FOR THE BEANS

- 1. Wash well and soak overnight in plenty of water.
- 2. Boil about 10 minutes in cold water, until outside skin breaks when blown upon. Skim. (Added by hand in one copy They get soft enough by long baking.)
- 3. Put a layer of salt pork or a portion of drippings in bottom of earthen pot, and alternately pour in beans and salt port. Earthen Pot by all means preferred.
- 4. N.B. molasses etc for coloring spoils the taste of baked beans.
- 5. Add salt to taste, and a little saleratus.
- 6. Bake in moderate oven from 3 to 4 hours, or until they become a rich brown color.
- 7. Sour kraut, pickled beets, or mustard pickles may be served as a relish with beans.

God bless you and yours. Praised be His Holy Name in all His unsearchable designs! I read your pathethic oetter this morning and again just now. Yours is certainly a peculiar case. But after all, whose case is not a peculiar one? As no two grains of sand can be found exactly alike on all the strands of the oceans and as "star differeth from star in glory", so the ups and downs of this "life". So too the rainbows, the sun bursts, gentle breezes and the real Hellstorms we are liable to meet before, by the grace of God, we shall be able to tumble into our graves with the confidence of tired Children into their places of peaceful slumbers.

But dear Sister; we are never justified in being "bitter" toward anyone except ourselves. In very deed, if we were only one tenth as appreciative as we have every reason to be; our gratitude for what God has done for us directly and through His creatures, most especially through our immediate superiors, - would be such that we would be perfectly content with what we are and what we have, without ever dreaming of what others may be in themselves, or what in all the world we may have "missed". Furthermore, to ever hope for really "true happiness" this side of Heaven has been alway vain. only a dream Hence Father Ryan, the "Blind Poet of the South in his "Song of The Mystic": "... I walked in the world with the worldly. I craved what the world never gave "And I said: 'In the world each ideal that shines like a star on life's wave; "Is wrecked on the shores of the real(ity), and sleeps like dream in a grave. The peace, etc promised by the world is the peace of the Serpent - ahellofapeace Ofcourse, there is such a thing as getting "a taste of Heaven" in this world, as we see clearly inthe lives of many saints. But that is only possible - and its up to each of us to strive for - in as much as our virtue of Hope is inspired by Faith in God and strengthened -sweetened - in confidence of His great, merciful goodness. But 0! "to enjoy life in the world" is another thing.

How long your Great...Grandmother Eve dilidallied with Satan before she finally reached for the fatal apple, Holy Scripture does not tell. So, rather than leave her in some old ash-can or later-on turn her out inexperienced, a probable victim for wolves without conscience or morality, she was nursed-on and mothered as though someone in justice really owed it to her. Dear Sister Mary Joseph: what you need most - and you are no exception - is a little more appreation for what's been done for you. Thank God for it all But don't forget the Fourth Commandment and those who take the place of Father and Mother; - who, in your case have taken that place so long.

Finally, I would ask you to just compare the two short questions; first, the one of Old: "Why should we - Adam and myself - not be permitted to even look at the beautiful Tree?" and then: "Why should we - Sr. M.J. and myself not have a chance to enjoy 'life' as other girls?"

Just one little question in conclusion. Where do the great majority of the "other girls" come to in their "enjoyment of life"?

If you stop to observe at all you must see that the majority of them find a very short taste of real joy. A sadly portion of them fall to be sickning "flappers", despised by men and women alike; "houses painted in front with vacant attics and nothing stable below".

If you had to deal with the cases of lost virtue and of blited faculties and of shattered hopes that every confessor and every doctor meets, one of your first prayers would probably something like the following: 'joys of life' as promised by the world and passion; O Lord deliver us!"

My dear Mrs. Dotson:

God bless you and yours. Many thanks for your kind favor of last week. I am sending the certificates, etc., under separate cover.

I am glad you told me of the handicapped little girl with the brain tumor. And since you give such details of the parents etc., I hope the whole "tragedy" may turn to have been a blessing in disguise; viz, to bring the child and all concerned closer to the dear Lord.

I am going to copy some notes I made on a case of brain-tumor, the cure of which I know about. This case came to my know-ledge almost three years ago, when two ladies came to the Monastery Office on Mt. Elliot Ave. in Detroit, Michigan; Feb. 23rd, 1943. The elderly of the two introduced the younger:

"...This is Mrs. Wheeler who is not of our faith but whose husband is very sick and she would like to speak to you about him." Mrs. Wheeler was weeping. I asked her what denomination they belonged to and she answered: "Methodist." "Well, thank the dear Lord," I answered, "we're both Christians, so that in a way you belong to my faith anyhow because after all there is only one Christianity."

"But what is the trouble?" "My husband had a tumor removed from his brain just a month ago today and just this morning they performed the third operation on him. They give me very little hope of his recovery." "Now Mrs. Wheeler, I have a proposition for you to make." ... It was Tuesday. "You make a promise to the Good God in your own honest way that if your husband gives the doctors a surprise tomorrow, or by the end of the week, you will be earnest about finding out for yourself, at least something of the difference, or better said, something of the relationship between your denomination as a Methodist and the "Mother Church." "I'll do anything to please the Lord," she said weeping, "if He'll only spare my poor, dear husband."

The following Friday the same two ladies cameback quite smiling and with them a man with his head all shaven and one side quite tape-up Whom Mrs. Wheeler introduced: "...This is my husband.".....He had certainly given the doctors - Peet and Wood - of the Ann Arbor one of the surprises of their life; who together declared, as I have it in the said note "..miraculous that a patient should talk normally four days after such an operation." They had given him at the longest six months to live. I gave Mrs. Wheeler a copy of the "Conception" of Mary, viz, the first book of the "Mystical City of God" by Venerable Mother Mary of Agreda; that she might learn something in particular about the august Queen of Heaven our Blessed Mother Mary, that in this at least she might get an idea of how sadly those Christians are wanting in the out-standing feature of Christinaity, "Devotion to Mary," who know little or nothing of the same BLESSED MOTHER OF GOD, save that in general she was just the Mother of Jesus.

About a year and a half afterwards, October 16th, she same to lament that her husband was not acting as he ought of late. I had not seen or heard from them since a week or so after said surprise visit. I asked her if she had ketp her promise -- and particularly about the Blesses Virgin. She hung her head and acknowledged she had neglected to do so. A few nights afterwards they both came back and were seemingly quite happy and satisfied. They had evidently started earnestly to keep the promise she and probably both had made. At all events he especially seemed enthusiastic about the said Book. He surely looked and seemed to feel happy.

I have no doubt that if those parents of whom you wrote me - the one baptized a Catholic at least and the other, though good at heart. with little or no faith - would wake up and turn to the Good God they would get a happy surprise. In case they come to New York any time, I would be pleased to see them. In the meantime, we will hope and pray. God bless all.

Notes of Fr. Solanus Casey were typed on back page - referred to above:

To every normally thinking mind, atheism, the very antithesis of noble, progressive science has always been recognized as, by its very nature, a blasphemous suggestion of the devil. This, however, does not exactly cap such a monster as we shall show presently, God willing. If we first have an idea of the primary and immediate purpose of atheism together with an knowledge whence it comes, as above, it will not be difficult to appreciate something of its perversity.

The direct and immediate object of atheism, in the designs of Satan, is to weaken belief in the supernatural and to rob souls of their life-giving faith in Almighty God. In other words, Begotten in Hell's hatred of God and in its coniving envy of mankind, atheism, by boldly denying the very existence of God would nihilize the very idea of supernatural virtue; and thus bring man down, not only to the level of the brute-beast but unspeakably below such a level; because, whereas the brute-beast has never been endowed with the faculty of hoping of believing in anything, especially above the senses; while the very soul of happiness for the rational man, consists in confident hope of what faith assures him is coming to him.

Atheism, therefore, (as a suggestion) aims at the very sources of mans' happiness, temporal and eternal. Hence the definition:

Atheism, to every normally thinking mind, is by its very nature, a blasphemous suggestion of the devil, and the "omega" (Climax), of intellectual and moral insanity; is at once the hopeless conclusion and the desperate refuge of shallow thinking, of degenerate minds and - lamentably - of damned fools; none their primary leader other than Lucifer himself, the reprobate prince of diabolical deceiver's and, by God' permission, chief dictator.

Dear Madam Trabulsy: God bless you and yours. I hope you are well.

Afriend of your Daughter Jenny's, Miss Rose Faris, writes me that Jenny is very low with poleo and asks for prayers, that if it be God's holy will she recover. I am enrolling Jenny in what we call the Seraphic Mass Association for prayers of hundreds of thousands of people.

The members of this association are asked to pray for our foreign missionaries and their work and for oneanother; those members of course who can pray. Also those who can afforde to do so are asked to help with an offering of somekind besides by prayers and Masses. I am confident that this will help your Jenny. This especially if you and yours do your part.

You will get an idea of what I mean by telling you of a remarkable case in Detroit about four years ago. I made a note of it at the time which was about as follows.

"Jan. 9th. Judge Healy called this evening: '... There is a certain Dr. Kleitzer in my office whose only child is very low with spinal maningitis and the Dr's give him very little hope of recovery. He is not a Catholic or a Christian. He is a Jew, a good, God fearing fellow. 'I wish you would enroll the boy in the Mass Association and pray for him. "I'll be glad to do that." I answered. "Tell the parents I'd like to see them." "I'll bring them over tomorrow." he answered"

"Mext day (Saturday), I saw them - the judge and the Dr. waiting over in the corner about 1:15 p.m." Introduced to the doctor. I asked," .. How is the boy?" "Well, he slept last night!" (the first time in a week)... "Now Dr., I have a proposition I want you to make to the Good God yourself. "I understand you're a Jew." "Yes." "That is Okay Dr. After all if religion can be defined as a science and I claim it is unquestionably the greatest science of all times; In fact it is nothing less than "THE SCIENCE OF OUR HAPPY RELATIONSHIP WITH GOD AND OUR NEIGHBOR.", then there can be but one religion, though there may be a thousand different systems of religion." "Dr. seemed pleased but said nothing.

"Twenty-five minutes later the Judge phoned: 'I thought you would be pleased to hear; I brought the doctor right back to the Children's Hospital and in the vestibule we met the mother of the boy, his wife all smiling. "At 1:30 he opened his eyes and smiled at me'. "A week later (Sundad) he was brought home in perfect health."

Dr. Klietzer told many people about this remarkable recovery. I learned later that his father was a Jewish rabbi. The last time I spoke with Judge Healy I asked about Dr. Kleizer. He regretted that, cwing to some political misunderstanding and exagerated report the Dr. resigned his position in the Children's Court and is now in business for himself.

Moping that the above may not have been too boring for anyone and that if it be God's holy will your Jenny may give the doctors and all concerned a favorable surprise of somekind, I remain,

My dear Dr. Young:

God bless you and yours for a blessed Christmastide and, please God too, a happy prosperous New Year. I was sorry to learn of your not being well. I hope its nothing too serious. But whether serious or not, we may be sure that inasmuch as we take such things as from the hand of God, they will never fail in the end to turnout as having been a blessing in disguise. At all events I am enrolling you in the Seraphic Mass Association and am praying for your speedy recovery and thereafter speedy improvement, - physically of course and, what is infinitely of more importance, spiritually.

God knows that, in our stupidity we all need real conversion to Him. Anyhow, I hope things brighten for you soon in both regards. No question about it, if we do the right thing on our part God never fails us. Just here, however is always a danger. We are naturally so inclined to go wrong. Therefore too, our obligation to admonish one another when danger threatens.

Hence, Dear Doctor Young: I feel that I would not be your friend or even a decently grateful patient were I to be silent as to dangers ahead of you as I see them without any doubt.

Only yesterday a middle-aged couple - friends of yours too - lamented to me that after several years in holy matrimony, they had never been blessed with - what I have long since considered the greatest blessing that, in the natural order, God gives on earth, A Family. And my Doctor Young has no family. ? Because the family that God blessed him with has no head.? At all events, it is a sad situation; and notwithstanding the fearful prevalence of similar cases, it must be, in the sight of Heaven a most lamentable problem.

Not since yesterday only Doctor, has this been on my mind; but since away back in July, and decidedly more so since early in September; when a youth came into your office while I was waiting in one of the apartments and whom, judging from his voice and the familiarity that followed between you, I took to be a son of yours of probably fifteen to seventeen years. He seemed promisingly bright and alert; but what pained me as the little dialogue proceeded was the sad want of filial reverence and even respect shown to his father. So much so, in fact that I almost called out to him: "Boy ... Honor thy father and thy mother". "Alas", I thought afterwards, "The poor lad has only an absentee father and his mother a convert Where is the responsability? Who's to blame?

The party was evidently a friend of yours, as well as of your whole family. Of this I was convinced after a very few words. If you remember I had just given a definition of, "THE GREATEST SCIENCE OF ALL AGES" as, "RELIGION IS THE SCIENCE OF OUR HAPPY RELATION-SHIP WITH GOD AND OUR MEIGHBOR", adding that, while there may be an indefinite number of "religious systems", there can be only one science of RELIGION".

My dear Doctor Young:

God bless you and yours. I hope you are well. Perhaps I ought rather to say I am trying to hope for your welfare, - spiritual of course and especially, as well as physically and socially: because after all in the sight of Heaven, the first is what supremely counts.

I have been wanting to write you Doctor these several months. In fact I started a couple of letters to you before Christmas, especially when I learned of your serious heart-attack and enrolled you in the Seraphic Mass Association. But first let me too, as a member of the community, thank you for your charitable favor to Rev. Father Guardian several weeks ago. I was doubly pleased to hear of it - for your own sake as well as for the needy poor. For it would seem in many cases that just such exercises of charity has meant the final salvation of many a soul otherwise most likely lost.

Now dear Doctor Young; I want to tell you in all sincerity and truth, that for close to a year you have been a problem on my mind, and I feel that I would not be a friend of yours or a grateful patient were I to let the present holy Easter Season pass without at least fraternally calling your attention to the very grave danger ahead of you, of completely losing the very little faith in Jesus Christ and His Church which, (un) fortunately at least, you seem to have left. But; "Why such an alarming conclusion?", you will ask. For indeed your outlook in my way of reckoning is grave.

First. Because, according to the greatest theologians, the first punishment on sin is the withdrawal of sanctifying grace — of God himself, therefore, — and the consequent weakening of the soul to fall again with less resistence into the same and other sins. For: "God will not remain in a soul subject (to) sin." But surely this must apply to the culpable neglect to foster and to practice that God—given faith that we have so gratuitously received and which has been so tenderly and conscientiously fostered in our souls, — God himself breathing it into our very immortal souls with loving parents and tutors so providentially solicitous.

But, in God's blessed Name, who can claim exemption from such Guilt? I for one could never dare think of such a thing. Can you Doctor? Then, if "gratitude for favors is one of the first and surest indications of intelligence", then, in the name of everything that is logical, and intelligent and holy; let us be men enough to acknowledge our weakness, our stupidity, our real insanity and guilt in the sight of Heaven: that by such humble acknowledgement - How mercifully simple and easy! we may recover our friendship and our peace with our God in Heaven -- at once -the divinely gentle and loving Governor of the universe, and the no less divine Avenger of the proud and the stubborn who refuse to appreciate His merciful goodness and to cooperate with His gracious condescinsions.

Something for me as well as you Friend, and us all to think about. Not? Then Doctor: you possibly remember reading the great encyclical of Pope Leo XIII on the Holy Eucharist, even when it first came out. Anyhow, I think it has been generally considered a decided master-piece, at once like-inspired and indeed very inspiring. Here is a notable passage from it that I have often considered and that have often wished were proclaimed again and again, in season and out of season:

"History bears witness that the virtues of the Christian life have flourished best wherever and whenever the frequent reception of the Eucharist has most prevailed. And on the other hand it is no less certain that in days when men have ceased to care for this heavenly bread, and have lost their appetite for it, the practice of Christian religion has gradually lost its force and vigor."

And because society is made up of individuals these great, great documents, - the encyclicals - pertain to the instruction and the welfare of the individual and society in general alike. Hence it goes on, like a divine admonition and exhortation:"

"And indeed it was as a needful measure of precaution against a complete falling away that Innocent III., in the Council of the Lateran. most strictly enjoined that no Christian should abstain from receiving the Communion of the Lord's Body at least in the solemn paschal season." Ah! "as a needful measure against a complete falling away..."

Where are any of the protestant sects to-day or the protestant nations in their, "practical faith in God and in Jesus our divine Redeemer, or in God the Holy Spirit our divine Sanctifyer? Where is Russia? Where is official England or official Germany or France? etc? They have followed the individual. To a sad extent they have fallen victims to atheism - the most diabolical cancer, because the climax of intellectual and spiritual insanity, -- at once, -- the hopeless conclusion and the "desperate refuge" of shallow thinking, of perverse and degenerate minds and, almost fearful to say, of damned fools. Hell is its officeal headquarters and none other their supreme knight than Lucifer himself, the prince of diabolical deceivers."

Protestantism! Christianity without our eucharistic God! without Holy Communion! ? Christianity without the virtues of the Christian life!

We had a memorable funeral in Detroit about ten or twelve years ago, - memorable no doubt for those called to attend it. A one-time prominent judge who as a youth and as a young professional had been quite commonly looked upon and not infrequently referred to as "a model young Catholic", but who, for some cause or other abandoned the practice of frequent and regular Communion. Little by little he had left off attendence at Holy Mass on Sunday and shortly dropped that practice too, altogether.

Finally he turned more or less against religion entirely, as it would seem, since he discouraged at least on 32nd degree mason from personally looking into Catholic claims and practices. Of this I was informed by same mason's own widow, who having called for a priest on his death-bed died a Catholic. This was several years before the unfortunate death of the judge, who seemingly having become disgusted with himself and with everything else, went secretly and hanged himself. I think dear Friend: this ought to suffice to convince you that my apprehension as above, is not at all far fetched.

I am not the least surprised Doctor; that under the circumstances and most especially in your present condition of mind and soul, you simply shudder at the thought of returning home to your family. That condition has been a long time growing in your mind and soul, - most probably starting with the first time you deliberately missed your Sunday Mass or some other mortal sin.

Going back to your family, however, is a secondary matter and can in a number of ways be bridged over without great difficulties. If ever again you get back into the grace of God by a good, humble confession, that "preternatural fear and dislike you now experience for things you once revered and loved, will at once weaken, and, little by little you will in all probability come to your old happy self again.

But to dance along the "wide road that leads to destruction" and in a state of most probable mortal sin, dily-dallying with a possibility of some day obtaining the grace of God and eternal salvation, is a fearfully perilous course to take. To my mind it is positively following the steps of our unfortunate judge above referred to, in an appallingly close imitation, and something to checkup on at every and all costs.

Hoping dear Doctor, that I have not been over harsh in my conclusions and that this may not discourage you. Rather on the contrary that it may simply wake you up before it's too late, from your most threatening drowsyness, I beg to remain

Sincerely at your service in any way wherein I may be able to do you a favor.

My Dear Doctor Young:

May the Lord give you his peace!, you and yours - that peace of which the "world" knows little or nothing; the peace which St. Francis was so astonishingly successful in promoting, the peace to establish which, the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity came down from Heaven and lived, suffered and died as man and the promoters of which, "shall be called the children of God".

I have been wanting to write you Doctor but I feared to embarrass you. I have wanted to talk things over but you've escaped me. I was pleased at your bringing that, "Companion of the Summa", as you called it. I would wish to have seen more of it and to have talked it over with you — in connection with the primary purpose of my visit. For, to be frank, much as I appreciate your treatments and miss them and thank you for them, they must be altogether of secondary importance in face of the condition of your immortal soul and the danger of which I see you to be in of losing it together with your faith in God and His Church.

I was happy to see you, as it seemed to me, that you were trying to do the right thing and to be happy. To the rational creature it must mean the same thing. I still hope you are trying. What more can any of us do? Its all the Good God requires or expects of us. - TO TRY. Success must depend on Him. He does expect, however, and He will be the Judge as to whether we will have used the means He offers to insure the success He expects and which His justice will demand.

Alas for humanity! How sadly few comparatively, ever think of such an obligation? - Alas! Hence the want of peace for the individual. hence the turmoil! - domestic; - national, - international! Everyone seeking peace, - as positively as the stone in the air seeks rest - and there is no peace for the rational creature except in the willing service of its Creator.

Dear Doctor: You gave me a treatment on Tuesday. God bless you for it. I hope that I shall always appreciate such favors - every and all favors; for appreciation means gratitude and: "Gratitude for favors is unquestionably one of the very first and surest indications of intelligence." But I felt that day there was something on your mind; that you were not your own self - happy as you ought to be. In fact I've felt that way more or less right along. The next day I again had the great privilege of singing a High-Mass, and as usual for several months I had J.P. pretty much in my mind. During the "Pater Moster", possibly due to more than ordinary fervor, when I came to the words: "...sicut nos dimittimus..." - And forgive us .. as we forgive those who trespass against us", I almost faltered. There was something like an answer or a response in my very soul to the effect: "Unless and until he forgive .. I can not." That evening at Matins you came to my mind again as I intoned the psalm: "Nisi Dominus...", "Unless the Lord build the house, they labor in vain who build it." (126) And from the other choir came back the response like a divine sanction: "Unless the Lord keep the city, he watcheth in vain that keepeth it."

Now Doctor: I want to assure you that it is not to embarrass you that I am writing you thus. On the contrary, I positivily feel that I could not be your friend without making as strong an effort as possible to save you fearful embarrassment unquestionably ahead of you unless, by the grace of God you open your eyes and cease trying to do without Him, - without God!

After all, what is the embarrassment of a friendly fraternal correction when contrasted with the multiplied accusation at the General Judgement Tomorrow before heaven and earth as well as all Hell? But you dear Doctor; while in quite a number of ways you have been doing good - have been an asset and a credit to the Community at least as far as the general public sees. You have used the talents God has lent you to a great extent in a creditable manner. Has not God bles'd you too, and temporarily at least filled your heart with grateful appreciation for the ability to do for Him and for humanity? But are you going to drift on, and into eternity satisfied with the natural "kick you get out of it"? - and the temporal advantages, including in this latter the shadowy credit of an unthinking public? I am asking - addressing - these questions as to a brother who can draw conclusions; as to one who, in the sight of Heaven can not plead ignorance. Transcript of a short talk by Father Solanus Casey. Recorded on a 78 rpm record at the home of Joseph and Winifred O'Donnell in Chicago c. 1947.

My dear friends: You asked me for a few words on my trip this morning. As we raced down the Mississippi on the Hiawatha, with the zepher across - across the Mississippi - the words of the psalmist came to me on science. And I thought, when shall we wake up to know that the greatest of any particular science, must depend on the gravity, the importance of the subject treated? Botony for instance or zoology, simple sciences, interesting in themselves. Music is beautiful, the flute, the piano, the . harp, the violin, queen of them all - music on the cross - how sweet when properly mastered. Then the science of astronomy that treats of the innumerable planets, their wonderful order, their speed, their inconceivable distances - the marvelous clock-work of the universe. They talk too, of a less attractive science, but oh how important, that of mathematics. But what are all these petty sciences when there is question of that one great science of all ages, all generations; the science of our relationship with God and our neighbor - religion! No other science in the end, amounts to the snap of ones finger. But for time and for eternity the science of religion fills the individual and society alike with hope, the very soul of happiness, this side of Heaven. Then the verse came to mind on the purpose of the rational creature - my purpose is this:

My Dear Mr. Taylor:

God bless you and your poorly, dear Wife, Bernice. May He bless your whole family and all your friends!

I received your pathietic letter of January 23rd and do surely sympathise with you. I hope, however, that is His great mercy and infinite wisdom the good God may see fit to draw good from your plight and as He never fails to do, inasmuch as we take our crosses in resignation at least to His holy will, turn your seeming misfortune to have been a blessing in disguise.

I have been down here in St. Felix since last April. So for the present am no more at St. Bonaverture's in Detroit; though I was up in Detroit all last week, as the little cards may at least intimate. You might do well, nevertheless to visit the Monastery there on Mt. Elliott (#1740). They can enroll you in the Seraphic Mass Association as well as I can, and that is a big feature in the "secret" of the many notable favors there reported - as well as in our other friaries. Thanks be to God.

At all events, dear Mr. Taylor, I am going to tell you of just one of said notables; that you may draw your own conclusion and as I sincerely hope, draw therefrom a happily profitable lesson. The case was noted close to four years ago in my own hand and runs substantially as follows:

"March 26th, 1943, Andrew Wheeler, a methodest of 686 Manistique Ave., Detroit, had 'brain-tumor' removed four weeks ago, (Febr. 23). At first, operation seemed to have been successful but two weeks later infection started. March 12th second operation. "Last Tuesday, March 23rd Mrs. Wheeler accompanied by a Catholic neighbor came weepingly lamenting; "...They have just operated on my Husband the third time in a month and they give me very little hope of his recovery. .."
"Now Mrs. Wheeler", I pleaded, "do not take it so hard. We will pray for your husband and enroll him in the Mass Association and try to induce the our dear Lord to take over the case Himself".I recorded Mr. W's name, etc.

"Now Mrs. Wheeler, I have a little proposition for you to make yourself to the good God in your own honest way". "I'll do anything to please the good God", she interposed, "if He will only spare my poor, dear Husband"! "Well this is the proposition or promise I want you to make, if you choose this rather than something else, whereby to please God. It is more a suggestion, therefore, that you promise or earnestly resolve in your own mind to look into the claimes of that "Mother Church" divinely planned and proclaimed infallible, and the claims of any other denomination or system of religion. Or I might say that you look into the connection between them".Mr. Wheeler came home the next day the day before yesterday and is here with his wife and neighbor To-day. A patch of about three inches square was like taped around and above his right temple. While I was noting the surprise, he remarked to the party who had given him his place: "...its great to feel normal again, though I feel a little weak. Drs. in Ann Arbor, Peet and Wood, call it miraculous ... that a patient should talk intelligently inside of twenty-four hours after such an operation". Thanks be to God".

I had not heard from them for over a year and a half, when Mrs. Wheeler came to lament the her husband was not very well of late. I asked her if she had kept her promise as I had suggested and if she had read the book I had lent her - "The Mystical City of God". She humbly admitted that she had not. She had come without him, as she said, because she wanted to tell me about him first.

I told her without hisitation: "The whole trouble is in your failure to keep your promise, or your proposition whatever it was". She promised to return next night with her husband and in the meantime to do something to show her good will. It was very stormy the next evening, so that she phoned their inability to come as promised but that they would come the following evening. Following is the note I made under the original:

Oct. 18th, 1944. Thank God they are both here To-day.

He has started to read the said, wonderful life of the Blessed Virgin, the
"Mystical City of God" and is quite
enthused about it".

Among other things in praise the wonderful work, the "Mystical City: which has been referred to as the autobiography of the Bl. Virgin herself, he remarked: "I find so much in it that I have often wondered about.

P.S. Incidently, I think it is slitely an error for one who is a Christian (as I presume you are), or who believes in Jesus our Redeemer, to intimate that he does not belong to the same faith as another who, though believing in Jesus Christ and professing Christianity, happens to differ with him in some details, possibly not even essential. Because I claim that there is really but one Christianity, as scientifically there can be but one religion, though there be a thousand different systems of that "Greatest science of all times and or all generations --

"THE SCIENCE OF OUR HAPPY RELATIONSHIP WITH GOD AND OUR MEIGHBOR."

Dear Mrs. O'Donnell:

God bless you and yours. I hope you keep well. Many thanks for your charitable favor of February 7th, duely received and noted. Please pardon tardiness of acknowledgement, etc. I do hope you find things at least a little more promising in Detroit when you return thither, than they generally have been these many moons. And of course that you will be feeling better, and more able to bear up under the pressure that has certainly not added to your temporal peace.

And after all, dear Mrs. O'Donnell; I do congratulate you on the attitude and the conclusion that just that pressure, perhaps more than any thing else - aside from the grace of God - has been the means of bringing you to; viz, "... that probably I am the one will have to change and not notice every trifle.... quarling only makes matters worse."

How fortunate you are to have finally arrived at such a conclusion — by the grace of God and your own experience. Indeed, that looks to me like a good beginning of a real conversion. And, just incidently, the very first adage I remember wondering at, being about four at the time and not fully understanding its meaning, was: "WELL BEGUN, IS HALF DONE."

Sometimes, in fact very often, as we see in the lives of the saints, it is only after many a battle and a long struggle with ourselves and against the injustices of the world that we learn to appreciate, as otherwise we probably never would learn, the sweetness that patient suffering unfailingly brings in the end, - often long before the end. So that, as the present Mosignor E'd F. Casey wrote after quite a decade of youthful struggles he could write, on his final start in the seminary for the holy Priest-hood - the great goal of his heart:

I shall enroll her anyhow, as best I know, in the hope that possibly the merciful God may deign to smile some way at our "daring simplicity". Adored be His blessed designs.

In the mean time please send me her name for registration. Rather have her write me as she proposed to do and explain the trouble as best she can. Why should she hesitate? Details are not necessary of course. But something personal would naturally be better than a report from some one else. If, as you tell me, she tries I am sure we will be able to help her. We have had cases that I am sure have been more threatening by far than hers, judging from just what you have told me, that have come out better than before afflicted.

While waiting to hear from her I am sending you a letter for her, written by one of my reverend brothers to another - ordained just a year apart -- 1911-'12. For five yrs. the elder was hardly ever able to say Holy Mass. Now in his 80th year he says his office and Holy Mass every day. Thanks be to God. I am sure you will all like the letter.

You tell me as much as that our friend Grace Panyard guided you hither and again that you are not "of my faith". Whatever you be, you have an immortal soul - your ownself - to save for God; and I am glad to help you do that.

I presume that you are a Christian of some denomination. If I am right, then in saying you do not belong to my faith, you err in a way; because there is only one Christianity. Think a little and see if I'm right. I go further. If religion can be defined as a science, and I claim it is not only a science but the very greatest science of all times and of every generation; in fact the only science that in the end counts for aught, and without which all other sciences are vain allusions. Ah! "RELIGION, THE SCIENCE OF OUR HAPPY RELATIONSHIP (dependence on), WITH GOD AND OUR NEIGHBOR".

Furthermore, while there may be a thousand different systems of that science — a thousand various denominations — the science of religion remains one. Its up to the individual with the use of reason, cooperating with God's grace to find which is the best system and to choose it rather than any other. On his choice depends to a vast extent, his own peace and that of the community — as well as their hope for eternal happiness hereafter.

Even in his youth, however, it would seem the same judge had been naturally inclined to petty jealousy. Whatever the cause, he had little by little given up the practice of his faith - the sad way we are all inclined - and finally abandoned religion entirely and in the end went and hanged himself. May the dear Lord preserve us such a fate!

God bless you and your friends, and us all. I hope you are well and that your friend-patient is not losing. We received your wire some nights ago and enrolled M. O'Laugh'n in the Seraphic Mass Association as an emergency case. Today we received your special and are enrolling as the enclosed will indicate, a perpetual member.

Thanks be to the merciful God, we have had several notable cases of cures reported as through this means here as, especially in Detroit, and esewhere.

Rather than detail instructions what for anyone to follow, I am going to give you here a brief resume of a letter I wrote several months back to a presbiterian whose father, grand-father and great-grandfather were all presbiterian ministers and who I believe is now taking instructions or is possibly already a practical Catholic. In fact there are two cases here involved, - bothe noncatholic, therefore, Seery or an O' would say: "on the other side of the fence". It follows about thus:

"... I am sure dear Mr. R.J., I tolde you of the W. case, noted here just about two months ahead of yous. Lest I be mistaken, However, here it is in brief. 'March 26, 1943. Mrs. W. ...W. was a methodist, had been given up after the third operation on a braincancer as destined for death inside six months. (The first operation was on February 23rd). Mrs. Wh. weeping was introduced same

after-noon by a Catholic neighbor. "Ill do anything to please the good God if he'll only spare my poor, dear husband"., she answered. "Then, Mrs. W.", answered, "This is about what I would advise you. "Make a promise or proposition to Almighty God in your own honest way as a methodist, that if your husband gives the doctors a surprise tomorrow or by the end of the week (it was Tuesday), you'll be earnest in looking into the difference or rather the relationship between your denomination and the "Mother Church". They returned the following Friday with Mr. W. all taped-up but smiling. He had come home from the Univ.-hospital in Ann Arbor next day Wed.

Doctors Wood and Pete had pronounced his recovery miraculous.
.... October 18th a year and a half later they came back - the last time I saw them and he looked and acted as he'd never been sick. This, however, was two nights after she had phoned me, lamenting that he was not well, etc, and I had admonished her to do something toward the fulfilling of the promese she had made so many months before, if her husband were spared her.

Besides, I had given her a copy of the "Mystical City of God", - the winderful Life of the Blessed Virgin Mary, which I honestly consider her own autobiography; the actual writer being as her secretary Venerable Mother Mary of Jesus, of Agrada Spain. He especially seemed enthused over the book that night - had evidbeen on the "job" of reading the book, those couple of days.

Dear Friend:

God bless you and yours. I hope you are well, as evidently you are not too bad to write such an interesting letter as that which I have just read from your pen. And all notwithstanding your trying berievement of losing your dear, patient Wife Mercile.

I surely would like to have seen her and consoled her before it were too late. Rather I should say, to encourage her in her acts and dispositions of faith, hope, charity, patience, resignation, confidence in God etc. What a privilege; what a happiness to have been of assistence to anyone in their final struggle and to have whispered an encouraging prayer into the ear of the patient when naturally everything must seem dark and hopeless! From what you have written of her, however, with all her struggles and humiliations, etc, I think she must have learned quite a little of the one most important art of "dying well".

Incidently, I had an "atheist" in-law lose his eldest born, ten years ago on his way with his family to the diamond jubilee of his wife's parish - St. Joseph's in Prescott, Wis. That was where myself and a number of my brothers and sisters had been baptized, including one of my Rev. brothers.

I said "atheist" because he had never been taught much, if anything in childhood, about God and the science of religion and consequently had never joined any denomination. He was a good, clean-living man, however, and from the outstanding example of his wife - Kathleen O'Brien her maiden name - and the sweet prayers and peace pervading his home as a result; he had learned to admire the wonderful faith, so inspiring of hope and real supernatural charity, she practiced and fostered.

The son drowned in Chicago on their way to the Jubilee. It happened on his seventh birthday. They took the little corpse along and we buried it in her family plot a few paces from the graves of my two little sisters who died in one week when I was eight, 1878.

Pardon such details. But you were considerate in the details of your letters to me and I hope these may be to good in one way or more, so just briefly, I am inclined to believe it difficult for anyone except a parent to realize what such a death must have meant to my in-law. The poor man just seemed to wonder. It certainly made him think more deeply about essentials. However, that was not the worst. Just six years later after a brief illness, his said Kathleen also was taken; leaving him three children to mother for himself as best he might.

He wrote me at the time that at first he had just wondered like if the sun might shine again. This, however, seemed to be the turning-point. The greatest sermon he had ever witnessed — her example of never failing Christian virtues — had planted seeds of admiration for Christian faith in his

He, the Creator and Divine Governer of the universe in all its details, could create children as in the case of Adam and Eve without parents. He could teach little children without nuns or schools and give the holy sacraments as has been the case on several occasions, - without priests, therefore.

In His divine economy, however, God has been pleased to honor His creatures- most especially His rationals - by giving them, each according to his ability, a part of His own work to do. Rather I ought to say, by participation and cooperation in His won divine activity, etc.

Dear Sister Mary Cecilia: God bless you and all your community at S.Jos's.

I recieved your very interesting letter several weeks ago and started a number of times to enroll your little "hopless case" in the Seraphic Mass Association; and each time I found no name to record. Consequently postponed further action.

Now I am going to give you a few particulars about that notable case that you probably never heard. Then you will easily conclude something as to what I would suggest and advise.

It was Saturday Morning January 10th 1925 that a neighbor-friend of theirs from Port Huron, brought your dear Parents to the St. Bonaventure Monastery in Detroit. Your poor Father was hardly able to talk. He tried, however, to tell briefly how he felt and that the doctors said he had "ulsers of the stomach". Later on I learned that they had sent him home as a hopeless case of cancer. I told him quite a little about the Ser-- Mass Association and suggested that he do something for the missions.

"Now I have you name Mr. Eagen." I said. "And you can enroll perpetually if you wish. If you are anyway short, however, I would advise that you enroll for just a year now and promise a perpetual enrollment as soon as convenient, if things go favorably." With a feeble quivering voice he answered: "I sure will." I took him to be 75 years old or upwards; Your poor Mother looked old too. Sunday morning eight days later your Father dove his own car down to keep his promise. From their appearance alone I would hardly have known them; but themoment he spoke I thought: "This is the fellow from Port Huron!" He looked thirty years younger. He was only thirty-nine at the time. "But Father"; he said, "The doctors in Pt. Huron want to take an exray ... What do you think?" I asked him: "How much is it going to cost you?" "...\$25." "What do you think?" I asked your smiling Mother. They were bothe smiling all over. "Father, he don't need it. Look at him!" she exclaimed. "Listen." I said. "You make a promise to the poor souls in Purgatory, that if you are able to forget that apointment tomorrow, you'll enroll them for a part of it." "Gee!" he said, "I'll give them half of it. I'll go them fifty-fifty."

After that he drove down every week for several months. Febr.29th -I believe he had the whole Family down - having enrolled some other, as he nearly always did, he concluded about as follows: "Now Father; I want to enroll the Poor Souls as I promised them I would. Put them down for a good half of that \$25. - fourteen dollars."

Some years afterwards I was up to see an old lady in Smith's Creek who died shortly after with cancer of the stomach and your Father having heard of my visit came and took me over to see the little farm you refer to and I remember seeing little Dorothy. Congratulations on my "dream" even then of her vocation. Try at least to become appreciative for such a really surpassing privilege. - Think of it Sister M.C. A chosen spouse from among millions, - a spouse of the eternal King kings! How little it is possible for any mere creature to be adequately grateful for such a privileged calling! We can only try and that suffices. Do not forget to send in the name of your little "hopeless case" friend, and to have as many as possible to offer prayers and holy Communions, not only for her but for so many more sadly unfortunate "big shots" in hospitals and elsewhere who, having little or no faith, in the supernatural, refuse to believe in even the possibility of miracles, and who by a manifest miracle might be induced to at least pray for the gift of faith -- which Almighty God is only waiting to be asked for. We pray Thee, O God of might, wisdom and justice! through whom authority is rightly administered, laws are enacted and judgment decreed, assist with Thy holy spirit of counsel and fortitude the President of the United States, that his administration may be conducted in righteousness, and be eminently useful to Thy people over whom he presides; by encouraging due respect for virtue and religion; by a faithful execution of the law in justice and mercy; and by restraining vice and immorality. Let the light of Thy divine wisdom direct the deliberations of Congress, and shine forth in all the proceedings and laws framed for our rule and government, so that they may tend to the preservation of peace, the promotion of national happiness, the increase of industy, sobriety and useful knowledge; and may perpetuate to us the blessing of equal liberty.

We pray for his excellence, the Governor of this State, for the members of the Assembly, for all judges, magistrates, and other officers who are appointed to guard our political welfare, that they may be enabled, by Thy powerful protection, to discharge the duties of their respective stations with honesty and ability. We recommend likewise, to Thy unbounded mercy, all our brethren and fellow-citizens throughout the United States, that they may be blessed in the knowledge and sanctified in the observance of Thy most holy law; that they may be preserved in union, and in that peace which the world can not give; and after enjoying the blessings of this life, be admitted to those which are eternal.

REV. FATHER STEPHEN, AS I REMEMBER HIM

"Shortly after our ordination to the holy priesthood--Fathers Damas, John, Fabian, Pius and Maurus--I was sent to the Sacred Heart Monastery in picturesque Yonkers, New York. Father Stephen who was about my age and had been ordained several years ahead of me and had preceded me thither at least a year or two and even then, though second to the Very. Rev. Pastor, Fr. Bonaventure Frey, seemed to be the popular Father and the Monastery--his bell continually ringing.

"From the very first he seemed to me to be a really earnest, zealous priest; always, not only willing but solicitous to help whom and where he might, without exception, high or low, rich or poor, learned or ignorant, Catholic or "Atheist." He was surely He had many friends among our non-Catholic not over-talented. neighbors over on Hudson Terrace, especially where the more wealthy and the "millionaires" were wont to employ Catholic girls and young-men. It would seem that he never failed to ask for the employer-master or mistress--of the house when he visited the employees. Later on, when continuing such visitations I found that many of these dear good people would feel slited if we failed to see them too. It just seemed sufficient to ensure employment if a Capuchin father sent any one over where there was work to do. Father Stephen was friendly too and was seemingly missed by the clergy as well as by the laity whenever anything important was on; even though he never seemed to care about making personal friends. In fact, unless he could see an advantage toward doing something to benefit, he was decidedly reticent and preferred to be alone. He was wont to retire (to) Jesus in the Tabernacle as often as convenient without being noticed, even in time of recreation. He worked hard on his sermons although he seemed always ready to take over any helpout that might offer itself. If the primary purpose of my creation as a rational creature is to know my Creator so that I can love Him and serve Him and be happy with Him; and if according to Holy Writ, no one but a fool can say in his heart, 'There is no God"; then the necessary conclusion would seem to be that God's existence, at least, must be manifest, one way or other, to every one who is not a fool; consequently, that every normal person able to think, can and ought to recognize his Creator - can and must worship God. And this under pain of losing everything good in the end and of damning his own soul - "cast out out into exterior darkness, where there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth".

However, in a matter of such tremendous importance it would be nothing less than positively criminal to be satisfied with the minimum. The foregoing is simply no answer atall to what we ought to have, -- and Please God to what we shall have. In the first place, there is something intrinsically in the very nature of man - and in the very nature of every rational creature --that instinctively feels its dependence on something greater than itself - on something supernatural. History and philosophy alike prove this beyond the shadow of an honest doubt, -- to say nothing of common sense; or of theology, the queen of all sciences, so much so, in fact, that to question it seriously, would be to intimate atheism again or a denial of God's existence which according to all sciences is nothing less than an insult, not only to honest reason to every normal generation back to our, Adam and Eve, but a most flagrant ignoring of Holy Scripture, and of divine revelation and of Gods own supreme Majesty, Who admonishes, Who pleads, Who commands: ". . . I AM THE LORD THY GOD . . . THOU SHALT LOVE THE LORD THY GOD WITH THY WHOLE HEART AND WITH THY WHOLE SOUL AND WITH ALL THY MIND AND WITH ALL THY STRENGTH . . LET NOT THE WISE MAN GLORY IN HIS WISDOM, AND LET NOT THE STRONG MAN GLORY IN HIS STRENGTH, AND LET NOT THE RICH MAN GLORY IN HIS RICHES: BUT LET HIM THAT GLORIETH GLORY IN THIS, THAT HE UNDERSTANDETH AND KNOWETH ME, FOR I AM THE LORD THAT EXERCISE MERCY AND JUDGEMENT AND JUSTICE IN THE EARTH: FOR THESE THINGS PLEASE ME, SAITH THE LORD". RELIGION AND ATHEISM DEFINED.

In view of the foreging "Very earnest words", and the general conditions of society -- including the threatening spread of atheism these days; of which a Jewish rabbi not long / lamented to the writer, especially among the Jewish youth, -- and we might say, most especially because of the lameness of Webster's information on the above; -- surely no one will object to an honest effort at improving on his definitions of subjects so positively vital for and against the individual and general welfare of https://www.men.unity.com/

First however, it will surely be not too much for us to presume as selfunderstood that any branch of study or learning deserves the distinction of <u>science</u> only in asmuch as it tends to the glory of God and the welfare of His creatures, e. g. the science of music, the science of mathematics, of astronomy, of oratory, etc.

Hence the positive and supremely outstanding claims of religion to such a distinction; for in all branches of knowledge and themes of study and research, where can anything be found whose claims to promoting happiness can even compare in depth of meaning, in broadness of scope, in sublity and universality and necessity of riligion ? -the Great Jehovah Himself, midst the thunders of Sinai proclaiming: "I am the Lord thy God. Thou shalt have no strange gods " just an echo down across the ages from the first instruction and commission to Adam and Eve, confident that in as much as His new creatures were rational so they would be also appreciatively grateful. An echo? Yea, and as history repeats itself among the hills of generations and the mountains of world struggles, so too do the commandments to love God and neighbor -- Jesus Christ Himself, Son of the Living God and true Messiah of the ancient prophecies Himself stressing the same and proclaiming as he does through Christian philosophy, the principle till the end of time and into eternity: "Gratitude for favors received the first and surest indication of intelligence." And thru the present Roman Pontiff, Pope Pius XII: "Man's first and greatest duty and obligation."

Furthermore, not only is Religion a science pertaining to rational creatures on earth, viz, to mankind; but it is the greatest

Hence the definition:

"Religion: the science of our happy relationship WITH God and our neighbor."

Incidently, we might add that, like with other sciences, or branches of science, -- though there may be a thousand systems of religion -- there can be but one religion, according to the above.

As to Religion's "would-be-destruction", <u>atheism</u>; It really ought to suffice to know that atheism is positively and diametrically opposed to religion of any kind according to the above definition, and that of whatever system; that it would deprive man -- actually does deprive man in asmuch as it prevails -- of the privileged, the supernaturally hopefully duty of loving God and neighbor; thus aiming at positively hinilizing the very sources and soul of the supernatural and again; thus, by degrading man below the brute-beast that has no faculties for exercising hope, offers him despair instead. Hence the demand for what may seem strong words in the definition:

I hope this finds you well, which means of course hopeful too. This latter is something that is sadly overlooked, to the great detriment of spiritual progress as well as physical.

The probably all-outstanding example of proof of this is the historical scandal that some of the disciples took at Jesus' choice of the CROSS AND CALVARY whereby to establish His Reign of love, rather than any other; - the scandal that drew from St. Peter himself: "Master! Far be it from thee...." and the alarming response: "Get thee behind me satan Thou saverest not of God".

It is well to remember that such scandal was never intended to be confined to the Apostalic-age: Hence, Saint Bernard - the outstanding Doctor of the Middle-ages - wisely reminds: "Since the scandal of the Cross it is never reasonable to take scandal". Another occasion of the first disciples taking scandal is the detailed insistence of His giving us Himself for our own life of soul: "I am the bread of life. Dear Rev. Father Provincial:

No doubt you will have been expecting a report of some kind concerning the privileged trip conceded me recently to the Funeral of poor, dear brother, Father Maurice Joachim. I started to do this the day after the solemnities; for all considered it was a real solemn funeral and seemingly a happy one. Blessed be God in His angels and in His saints.

A wire at about 7:30 Wednesday, January 12 from Ortonville, Minn. announced to us: "Father Maurice Joachim died at 6:20 this Morning". I erroneously took it for almost self understood that the Funeral would take place on Saturday, waiting for more particulars till near midnight, when a call came; but it was from a poor party - convert - lamenting their unfortunate divorce.

Your Very Rev. Paternity, on my long distance call had benignly bidden me go thither. Deo gratias. We concluded that possibly the funeral might be Friday and decided accordingly to take no chances. Hence, our plans to catch the Hiawatha as probably - surest train to make the desired connections.

It snowed that Thursday morning and to be sure of catching the "Golden Arrow" train on the Pennsylvania, we left early, for Ft. Wayne; - Brother Cook, Ignatius at the wheel and Rev. Father Guardian accompaning. Leaving Fort Wayne, the Conductor had to lament that he was 25 minutes late, which to me meant that we'd be nip and tuck in catching the Hiawatha in Chicago, if we didn't lose any more on the schedule thither. On leaving Huntington, however, we had said our Rosary for Divine guidance and protection and safe return and thanks be to God, I forgot all about worrying. We made it, even if the train had to wait a little, till they kindly got me a ticket.

I was still figuring on the Funeral being on Saturday and on my staying over night in St. Paul till, the first passenger off the Coach, my friends held me up. I had to go back on the train and they

accompanied me on to Minieapolis, whence, after an hour and a half, I was to take another train and go on two hundred miles further to Ortonville, Minn., right near the S. Dakota border; thence, after holy Mass next morning drive twenty miles to Graceville for the funeral at ten ocl. It was 3:30 when we pulled into that station. It had been moon-light all night, though rather pale, but with the snow on the ground I heard the train—men's view come out in harmony with my own: "Its a beautiful night".

We were about thirty miles from our train-destiny when I was able to stretch my bones in the empty smoking-car which was better than in a corner of a seat. Thank God that was a relief. I was at least half-asleep, when the gentle brake-man called me and I went out to find the Pastor patiently waiting. We were a half hour late. He, Father George Campbell, tooted when he saw me leave the train and greeted me like an old friend. He has a nice little (Church) - one altar - to accomodate about two or three hundred, St. Mary's. After holy Mass and breakfast, we made the twenty miles in a dense, freezing fog about twenty minutes before services. Father Ed'd had hardly expected me and was disappointed in his figuering on Monsignore Reaordan of Mineapolis - a one-time pastor of M.E.J., to give the sermon. No one else seemed ready for that privilege; so that I was ashamed to decline when asked if I would say a few words. I took the text that came to my mind as we were leaving for the Altar: "Quid Retribuam ...?" Thank God; though a most happy theme if properly developed, it could not, under the circumstances, be more than extempore. It seemed, however, to be satisfactory. A nice crowd of intelligent looking school children together with the silent sermon of a happy death of one who had weathered the storms of 81 winters consecrated to Almighty God, naturaly inclined my thoughts to vocations. (for 20 minutes).

It was surely to nature a very unpleasant experience; but thanks be to God! I feel that my soul profited greatly by the experience of about a month in hospital, -in Saint Michael's Milwaukee and St. Josephs, Ft. Wayne.

It was a "bitter pill that turned to sweetness of soul and body", as St. Francis tells us in the holy Rule, about his personal experiences with the poor, dear lepers of his day, and as many chaplains and soldiers tell of what the went through in the 2nd World War".

Mow dear Mrs. Kauffman: I hope you are turning this breaking of life's monotony - all unpleasant as such experiences are to nature, - into sacrifices of great merit. Dear Mrs. Eichhorn:

God bless you these days of unrest and suspense - you and yours. I have read your pathetic letter and do surely sympathize with you and your dear ones. I hope that the good God may manifest something of His merciful designs in favoring you with such a peculiar cross; for indeed, from sacred history the truth of the old saying - of St. Paul (?): "Whom the Lord loveth He chasteneth", is most manifest.

We've had several cases similar to yours and some of them altogether more tragic and hopeless - turn out to have been indeed real blessings in disguise. A single example: It must be ten or more years ago that a certain modest lady, having waited close to an hour, till all else had gone, introduced herself: "...I's not Catholic, but I would like to get a bessin too. I's always had head-aches". Her accent rather than her color indicated something of her particular origin.

About three hours later a well featured but very dark visitor of the same name and identical accent asked for a rosary. I told him of his namesake who had been in about ll a.m. "That's my Wife". She had come home without any headache. Glory be to God! They had been praying for a family for thirteen years and were naturally discouraged or becoming so. They believed in Christianity but had never been baptized. It is next to "Unbelievable", what difficulties they met with and, by God's grace overcame, before being received into the Church, and even for months afterwards. All Hell just seemed determined to shake them from their purpose.

We make it a point to stress the importance of making sacrifice in recognition of a favor received - having started out with an understanding, at least to that effect. For Catholics, e.g., more frequent holy Communion if favor is granted and preferable, by all means to start at once - to "get ahead of the Good God in generosity" if possible. For non-catholics, that they be earnest in looking into something of the claims of the Church; or something of the relationship - dependence of the denominations on the Mother-Church, etc and working accordingly.

God bless you Frater Don Bosco. I hope this find thingsmore promising with you and yours than seemed to be when you wrote me last week. The intentions you wrote about have been in my mind pretty much ever since reading your letter; and I hope in my poor prayers. No, I had not heard of your steping out of the Clericat. I was sorroy ofcourse and disapointed; but do hope that the Holy Ghost — the divine Spirit guided you and that in the end it will turn to have been to your advantage and to the glory of God. Glad at all events, that the trouble was nothing more than physical; for even from the clean sports' columns like in the lives of the saints, we find innumerable examples where such difficulties only heightened apprediation for the hoped-for ideal and Goal. One of the great advantages of a study of the lives of the saints, is the supernatural courage that such studying tends so positively to foster. And at the same time appreciation for one's vocation; -appreciation - the natural foundation of gratitude which, in its turm, - "Gratitude, the very first and surest indication of intelligence." Hence the poet's happy dictum:

"The lives of all great men remind

us that we can make our lives sublime.

"And, parting leave behind us worthy

footsteps in the sans of time".

Pope Pius XII; peerless and outstanding champion To-day of dogma, of morality, of peace among men and nations; stresses this virtue as man's first and gravest duty.

Lives of saints? ... In 1909 I had completely lost the hearing in my left ear and the same condition was rapidly threatening the other side. I had returned a certain Thursday-evening from the specialist with a throbbing ear-ache after a very painful treatment and very delicate and dangerous propositions. Five years before that, I had read the life of Sister Therese Martin, till then seemingly quite unknown, and had greatly profited thereby; happy in the communion of saints as I felt, on having met another heavenly little friend. I had felt from thefirst reading that she would be canonized. Well, in my anxiety that night I made a "mental proposition" to her that if she would help to save my hearing I'd read her life again. I was even then confident that she could help me and that being already in Heaven, she would.

Thanks be to God and His little spouse, now Saint Therese "The Little Flower. I have read her book fifteen times since that and have had at least that many favors.

The above will give you an idea of how I would advise you if you still hope for a vocation. Praying for vocation, if not a poitive vocation in itself, is surely an essential and outstanding feature in the character of every ideal Christian as well as in every practical missionary. Think it over, Encourage, foster vocations. Wherever we may be or whatever our state in life, we may in many ways become instruments of the Holy Spirit by praying for and promoting vocations.

Now, as to your "big problem"; as well as the minor interests to which you refer. I think you ought to be able to find a practical solution in the above, as primarily intended for your own personal guidance. I am inclined to congratulate you on your place of imployment, Mt Olivet Cemetery; and on your privileged connection with the boys of Holy Name Parish. It was a privilege of mine to be assistant in that dear parish twenty-five years ago and chaplain at the — then — comparatively new but leading cemetery.

God help us! How little we appreciate our privilige of being given opportunity after opportunity of suffering in diverse ways and of offering all in union with and for the intentions of the Sacred Heart of Jesus! I have been reading: "The Way of Divine Love; or The Message of the Sacred Heart to the World", as jotted down and noted by a most privileged contemporary of our own, the little, kitchen-lay-sister Josefa Menendeth, born in 1890 and called to Heaven December 29, 1923. - all in strict though gentlest obedience to Jesus and her superiors. What sufferings of soul and body she went through - what agonies she learned to welcome! - for the sake of helping Jesus to rescue straying souls! Glory be to God! For "practical children of the Church" such problems are to a great extent solved at baptism; so that by the grace of that Sacrament the principles of the "triune virtue of Faith - Hope - Charity" are divinely infused into the soul whereby, from the very start it becomes docilly inclined to believe; and to behold the Church and to confide in her with growing conviction as divinely founded and as infallibly guided in her capacity of mother and mistress of immortal souls - of human candidates for the life of eternal glory; of which St. Paul writes: "Eye hath not seen, ear hath not heard, nor hath it entered into the heart of man to conceive what things God has prepared for them that love Him".

But let us first lament your failure - which is not yours only but humanity's to which we both belong. Perhaps our sadest failure, notwithstanding our faculties for thinking and reasoning, notwithstanding our advanced steps in every phase of science and, (what ought to count most of all in the natural order of conclusion) notwithstanding uncounted ages of bitterest experience of men and angels, that ingratitude to God never pays. Many thanks for your pathetic communication of June 20th. Because of the hundred and more letters before me that claim response I was about to make very short work of yours before I had read half of it. However, I put it aside. Today, though the situation is not improved, I feel I must give you a few words. If you were a faithful "child of the Church", you would escape the danger of many of those problems of which you lament, viz, problems about God, science and religion. I must be brief.

First let me lament your failure - with your so-called science - you fail to recognize as a science, the greatest science itself of all times and of all places, viz, the science of our happy dependence as rational creatures, on God and our neighbor. That is RELIGION; the only science that in the end - amounts to more than the snap of one's finger. Like every other science, though there be a thousand systems (denominations) there can be but one such science. It might be defined also; "The science of saving our souls or simply: "the science of charity", whose primary purpose is to foster what is sometimes called "the triune virtue of faith-hopecharity". Because they are essentially one virtue, the positive contrast on first glance of "Atheism-despair-hate" of which your first two sentences seem so positively to lament, viz, someone's own agnosticism, hatred and consequent, worse than disturbance. I was going to say above, that practical Catholics know without a doubt what to believe concerning the referredto problems. Besides; the more anyone of good will knows about true religion viz, the system of divine and infallible religion - the infallible system of religion - established and founded by Jesus Christ and proclaimed by His Twelve Apostles - watering it with their blood in imitation of Jesus their divine Master; so much the clearer does the whole Christian system unfold before the eye of common sense, and of the highest reasoning, as well as in the light of divine faith - all true sources of science and all phases of true religion the crown and final purpose of all.

Rev. Paternity. Ah! for your own joyous relief as well as her estremely tried fortitude. I beg pardon for such culpable hesitation. Glory be to God. Following are a few details.

About twenty-five years back two young nurses came to Saint Bonaventure Monastery in Detroit seeking guidance in regard to starting a cancer-hospital. I enrolled them in the Seraphic Mass Association and promised to pray for them and their project. This repeated itself a number of times for two or more years; so that I was inclined to take them for a "sort of dreamers" (?).

. . . Finally while Miss Gibson was sice in a Detroit hospital her girl-friend the other nurse - her "saintly friend" as she considered, (a certain Miss Daily), died in New York. Just another knock for the girl-friend left to weep and to pray - - - of whom she was wont to speak as being a saint and on the help of whose prayers she still seems to have confidence. Having lingered at the Grave Miss Gibson plucked a slip of an "immortal" (a little plant growing on the grave), and simply put it in a little, round "vanity-box" perhaps two inches wide and a 1/2 of an inch deep, half saying to herself: "This will be my relique." Shortly afterwards she was packing her trunk to come West and without further ado, like tossed it into the trunk to take care of itself. Weeks afterwards she was looking for something else when the little "vanity-box" unexpectedly appeared. "O!", she thought, "Here is my relic!". Her emotion on finding it not only fresh and green but perfectly in bloom was unspeakably more than surprise. To me, when first I saw it and as often as I saw it - which was quite occasionally for more than a year --it was a "Blue-print from Heaven" and nothing less, of the institution that she and Miss D. had been dreaming of and praying for "Get started ", came to my lips the first thing following my astonishment. "Get started if necessary with a single patient in some old atic. and God Who loves tiny beginnings will know, as He always does know best, how and when to provide development." She did not have to start in such extremes. Her said little "miracullous blue-print" would seem to have carried her successfully at every turn; for she carried it with her everywhere and never hesitated to show it where appreciation for the supernatural might be expected. All this till Mercy Hall was well established and to stay. . . . Aye! "A really Catholic Hospital, with everything in detail and up to date . . . " . . . What a contrast after three years when Chapel and Altar were gone and no visits more to Jesus or reception of the Sactaments! Still Miss G. was a Catholic. Still her Catholic pictures and statues were in the corredors and parlors. Stell, though she wore no "habit" she was keeping up reception of the Sacrament herself. She had aged more than three years.

Less than a quarter of an hour's visit was sufficiently revealent. Dr. McClellan was my hoste and chauffeur, and he had an operation scheduled that morning and we necessarily had to be brief. One could only wonder as to the cause or the purpose of it all... But: "Who hath known the mind of the Lord? Or who hath been his counsellor?!!

As much as I remember I had not seen either of them for some months. They had always come together. Now Miss Gibson comes alone with such unwanted tidings. More remarkble still however, though of a happier color is her story of a phenomena in connection therewith and which bring us nearer to our purpose. - - our problem.

After her own recovery she - Miss G. - had taken a trip to New York, visiting friends and relatives as I understood - her own and those of Miss Daly - the deceased nurse-friend and naturally the latters place of burial. This visit or visiting lasted for some days (five to be exact, as she tells me now). At all events, she brought back with a slip or sprig from a little "immortal" already growing on the stell fresh grave where she had lingered these days and prayed and fostered supernatural hope. She had placed, the tiny sprig in a common envelope and when about / return / Detroit had placed it with some letters, etc, in her hand-bag. I am glad to hear from you, even though the tone of your letter is anything but too bright. It only convinces me more and more that there is something I am inclined to call drastic, shortly ahead of us. One thing is certain, if these are the days of antichrist as it seems to be more and more tending to a general conviction that way; then we must be on our guard against being scandalized; for it seems to me that it is most especially to activities of antichrist and his agents that Jesus refers in His admonition: Beware of Scandals: for it is necessary that scandals come. Nevertheless, woe to that man by whom the scandal cometh." St. Bernard the outstanding Doctor of the Church of the eleventh century was wont to exhort the people of his day, especially against taking scandal: "Since the Crucifixion of Jusus Christ, "he would admonish, "it is never reasonable to take scandal."Ah! Because from that climax of scandal God saved Humanity - decreed Heaven's rehabilitation. Glory be to God! ... Ascetic writers always stress openness and confidence with our superiors as with those representing or taking God's place in our regards.

As for "religious" in a community who persist in refusing to speak to member of the community because of some petty offense or dislike? ! The very fact of such example would in my opinion indicate as a rule, PITIFUL narowness. Patience in such cases and prayer for conversion of sinners - always including one'self - charity beginning at home. In this way we can help Jesus in His great purpose of converting and redeeming Humanity.

However, there is such a thing as "red communism" stealing into convents and monasterys. Very clever young men have been knowen to offer themselves as candidates for the Order who have turned out after months - sometime after years - to have been nothing more than secret promoters of unrest and red communism. Such candidates, I have heard of and in one case at least have known to show themselves very clever and experienced and naturall y older than real promising candidates say intheir late 20s or even middle 30s, and of course not too fervent atal, even tho at the same keeping the rule fairly to the letter. Of course, to suspect anyone definitely without a conscience observance and prayer, is a rather dangerous course. Nevertheless selfpreservation and "charity beginning at home", where rightly ordered Charity always must begin; superiors especially are expected to be on the elert concerning any subject who persists in refusing tospeak to, or associate with any other member of the religious family.
